Access to a keyboard for practicing. You may sign up for practice time in room F324 through the Department of Music and Art. If you are unable to practice at BMCC during the times available, it is strongly recommended that you obtain a keyboard for practicing.

Student Evaluation and Requirements.

In this course your understanding of the basics of music will be demonstrated and graded in several ways, through written, singing, playing, and listening activities and assignments.

Attendance and participation. Each student is allowed <u>four hours</u> of absence (not four days) for any kinds of reasons. In the case of excessive absences, the instructor has the option to lower the grade or assign an F or <u>WU</u> grade. Excessive lateness (more than five minutes late after class has started) will also result in a lower grade as will habitually leaving class early. If you are more than twenty minutes late to class, it will count as an unexcused absence.

Cell phone use in class will lower your participation grade (-10 points from your in-class grade that day for each instance I see your phone out).

In-class grades cannot be made up. In-class activities should be completed with a Music Department tutor before returning to class. Copies of in-class activities are available on the class website (www.drjonesmusic.me/bmcc-mu-105).

Practicing and tutoring. Each student is expected to attend every class session and to practice a total of *at least* two hours per week outside of class (preferably in smaller, daily sessions). In addition, every student is required to attend tutoring (provided at no additional charge) in Room F324 at least once per week for the entire semester to practice keyboard, singing, dictation, and written skills covered in class. Tutoring sessions are offered in 20-minute appointments. Bring your signed tutoring schedule card to class for the instructor to check each week.

Homework. There will be written homework for every class meeting. Written assignments are due at the beginning of class. After an assignment has been graded and returned to you, you have the option of submitting it again for a higher grade.

Written and performance quizzes. Every class meeting will begin with a written and/or dictation quiz based on the material covered in the previous class and assigned for homework. There will be a performance quiz (singing, rhythm, and/or keyboard) in the middle of every class meeting.

Exams. There are three exams in this course, to be taken at the beginning of the class period on March 7, April 4, and May 23. The midterm exams will only include written and dictation materials, and the final exam will include written materials, dictation, and performance skills. As this is a skills-based course, all exams are effectively cumulative.

Topics to be covered

As the prerequisite for all courses in the Music Major at BMCC, by the end of Mu 105, a student should be able to:

- Demonstrate understanding and correct usage of all elements of musical notation, including dictation exercises: keys (major and minor), note values, meters, intervals, triads, and seventh chords
- Demonstrate selected keyboard skills: major and harmonic minor scales, short two-hand musical compositions
- Match pitch, sing major and minor scales, and use basic singing technique
- Execute rhythmic patterns vocally and by clapping

Provisional schedule (subject to change). Every topic covered in Mu 105 builds on previously learned material, and each day in the course calendar will include a review and continuation of material from the preceding day(s), even if not explicitly listed.

January 31-February 28: Unit #1 – Solfège, Rhythm (w, q, h, e, s, dotted), Notation (staff, clefs, accidentals), Major scales, Keyboard playing with one hand

Jan 31: Intro to the basics: singing, rhythm, notation
